

### **Editorial**

Having just celebrated World Children's Day, we reflect on the achievements in Europe towards child-centred justice, but also on the challenges that children still face in having their rights respected when entering in contact with justice systems.

We sit still for a minute when we read, in the recent research conducted by Save the Children on violence against refugee and migrant children arriving in Europe through the Balkans, that every child who participated in this research had personally experienced violent, even cruel behaviour by the border police. We wonder why, according to data from the EU Fundamental Rights Agency, despite quite progressive legal frameworks, we see teenagers and children in criminal proceedings often treated as adults and sometimes questioned without a lawyer and denied assistance. We find it hard to accept that, according to the UN Global Study on Children deprived of Liberty, over seven million children per year are deprived of liberty in the administration of justice, held in immigration detention, detained in relation to armed conflicts or national security contexts, or living with their primary caregivers in detention.

With new emerging challenges children face on a daily basis - such as climate change, the energy crisis, exposure to the digital environment, the pandemic, the war in Ukraine and the migration crisis - the field of child justice is in constant evolution. World Children's Day therefore reminds us that children must be at the centre of our actions and that we need to pursue our efforts towards ensuring that justice systems respect children's rights.

Justice starts with Children.

## Legal Update

#### ECtHR judgement on the rights of the child (10/11/2022)

The case I.M. and Others v. Italy concerned the allegation by the applicants (a mother and her two children) that the Italian State had failed in its duty to protect and assist them during contact sessions with the children's father, a drug addict and alcoholic accused of ill-treatment and threatening behaviour during the sessions. Italian authorities disregarded the best interests of the children who were forced to meet their abusive father within the meaning of Article 8 ECHR. With regard to the children's mother, the Court considered that the decisions of the domestic courts suspending her parental responsibility had not taken into account the difficulties surrounding the contact sessions and the unsafe conditions highlighted on several

occasions by the various actors involved. <u>The Court therefore</u> <u>considered that the best interests of the children must take</u> <u>precedence over the right of a parent to be in contact with their</u> <u>children</u>.
